Nominations to D.C. Court of Appeals are finally coming to the Senate. Perhaps not so important for us to contact our Calif. Senators as I believe they will be for the nominee, but any of you who have friends or family or live in another State may want to contact those Senators.

Nominee Nina Pillard has an outstanding record of arguing 9 cases before the Supreme Court. She convinced the Court to be nearly unanimous on decision to open Virginia Military Institute to women. She worked with Bush administration attorneys to successfully defend the Family and Medical Leave Act in the Courts. She has supported AAUW policies. Let's get her on the Court of Appeals!

The effort in the Senate to remove rape cases from the line of command has been stalled. The military estimates that there are 26,000 males and females who have faced sexual assaults. It is an increase from 19,000 in 2010. It is double

Thanks to the generosity of many, we have met our fundraising goals for our local scholarship program so we will be offering EIGHT \$2,000 scholarships this year.



Are you a local history buff? Are you looking for new interesting volunteer opportunities? Here are three organizations looking for docents and willing to train you, no tests just good stories and information to share.
1. Tor House, Robinson Jeffers iconic home needs docents to help tell the story to small groups. You do need to be able to climb the tower. Member Kathleen Fischer helps out there. Interested? Call Kathleen Sohntag, docent coordinator at (831) 624-1813.
2. Carmel Heritage, First Murphy House. This is an easy one. You just need to donate three hours 12-3 one afternoon a month and sit in the parlor of this historic house and share the story of Michael Murphy and his place in Carmel history with visitors. Dual AAUW member, Donna Pribble is the docent coordinator and can be reached at 650 348-7220 or call Linda at the Murphy House at 624-4447. The house is closed to the public in December and January.
3. The Presidio Museum is run by the city of Monterey and is a little- known gem. To visit, just take Pacific to its south end as far as you can go and turn left onto Artillery and follow the signs to the museum. It's staffed by volunteers trained by Dennis Copeland. Commitment is 6 hours a month. It's open Thurs. through Sat. 10-4, Sunday afternoon and Monday morning. Shifts are 3 hours and you meet really interesting people from all over the world. You choose your shifts each month. This is an interesting opportunity for you or your significant other. At present we have 3 women volunteers and none of us have a military background.
