Equal Pay Day

April 17 is Equal Pay Day. Since 1913, AAUW has led the fight for equal pay for equal work for women. In 1963, President Kennedy signed the Equal Pay Act, and in 2009, President Obama signed the Lilley Ledbetter Fair Pay Act, but the Senate failed to pass the Paycheck Fairness Act in November of 2011. With female college graduates on average still earning 5% less than their male counterparts a year after graduation, and that gap increasing over time to about 23% less pay for woman than for men, Equal Pay Day represents a concern for inequity and a goal to strive for.

Two Minute Action Alerts

Currently, Governor Brown has reduced funding to the California Commission on the Status on Women by 50% along with cutting programs that benefit women and children. AAUW members can use their collective strength to restore funding by taking time to visit the AAUW website and becoming two minute activists.

February 1 was National Women and Girls in Sports Day. Title IX prohibits sex discrimination in federally assisted educational programs, but, especially at the high school levels, inequities still exist. The High School Athletics Accountability Act of 2011 addresses this issue and is a cause supported by the AAUW two minute activist.

Sexual assaults in the military number 3,191 reported cases with up to 19,000 unreported ones. The Sexual Assault Training Oversight and Prevention (STOP) Act seeks stronger rules and enforcement of them to protect our troops. We can help by becoming two minute activists.

Action Works

When Susan G. Komen Foundation opted to end the funding for Planned Parenthood that helped provide mammograms and other health for women who rely on these services, it faced an onslaught of negative reaction including AAUW's decision not to offer the Susan G. Komen Global Race for the Cure as a pre-conference

community service opportunity for attendees to its NCCWSL leadership event. Several days later, the foundation reversed its decision and will continue to provide grant money to Planned Parenthood.

Her work focuses on capturing the expressions and emotions of children. "I'm not a trained artist, but when I see a photo that captures me, I enjoy using it as an inspiration for my painting. I make the image my own with changes in color and background." She's also painted landscapes. Alana is active in our community and is retired from teaching elementary school in the Santa Rita School District.
- * If you attend the March 24 joint meeting of AAUW's MPB and Salinas branches at Hartnell College in Salinas, our Branch Historian **Nancy Iversen** suggests you take a look around the campus at the results of the 2002 Bond Issue. "Hartnell is a very pretty campus. Women's History Month Event on March 24

AAUW-Salinas will host the traditional celebration of Women's History Month of the Monterey Bay Peninsula and Salinas branches on Saturday, March 24, 2012, 11:30 AM, in the Studio Theatre at Hartnell College in Salinas. Featured are an on-stage picnic followed by a performance by the Legacy Players of the Western Stage debuting "Alma Spreckels: An Extraordinary Woman, Act Two." Reservations (see form below) are required no later than Wednesday, March 14. Space is limited.

Alma Spreckels (1881-1968), who married Adolph Spreckels of Spreckels Sugar Company, was a beautiful and dynamic woman who scandalized San Francisco society with her stand-back-here-I-come approach to promoting the arts and societal causes. The Legacy Players—a group of veteran actors who have graced the stages of many theatres in Monterey County—create material with roles expressly written for older actors. The group performed "Alma Spreckels: An Extraordinary Woman, Act One" in 2010.

Easy directions to Hartnell College in Salinas from the Monterey Bay Peninsula: Go north on Highway 68 (which becomes South Main Street) to the Steinbeck Center, turn left onto Central Avenue in front of the Steinbeck Center, and drive to 411 Central Avenue. The campus is on the left.

The Studio Theatre is located in the Performing Arts Building, near the center of the campus. Balloons and signs will be placed to guide you to the building. Parking is free on Central Avenue. Paid parking is available in the lot between the swimming pool and tennis courts on West Alisal or in the Parking Structure. Parking fees are \$1 for all day or \$0.25 per hour (quarters work best).
