Meet Ruth Ann Flowers



Ruth Ann says that from a very early age her passion was to be a teacher, wife, and mother. She definitely accomplished her passion and has had some interesting experiences along the way.

Originally from a farming community in Ohio, Ruth Ann's family moved to Novato, California, when she was a teenager. She graduated from Novato High School and went on to Sonoma State College, graduating in geography. Because of her husband's career in the U. S. Air Force, Ruth Ann taught school in Massachusetts, Florida, and California. A move to Merced, California, in the 1980s provided Ruth Ann with her most satisfying teaching assignment where she and five other teachers developed a program for Hmong refugee children. The program, using experiential learning to build the children's language and academic skills, served 200 children. Ruth Ann and the other teachers participated in the program from 8 to noon and later in the day attended classes at the local college in Hmong education. The success of the program and the

opportunity to use what was learned academically with the children was an exciting and fulfilling time for Ruth Ann.

Ruth Ann and her family moved to the Monterey Peninsula in the late 80s after her husband retired from the Air Force and have made it their home ever since. After coming here Ruth Ann taught at Chartwell School for a year and substituted at most of the private schools on the peninsula.

Ruth Ann is interested in golf and snow shoeing and volunteers her time with teenagers in the Carmel Presbyterian Church Youth Group, the City of Monterey Volunteers in the Parks, and at the Yellow Brick Road resale shop in Carmel. Ann Donaldson introduced Ruth Ann to AAUW/MPB through Romancing the Coast.

When asked if she has a motto or words of wisdom to share, Ruth Ann said that when she gets up each day she tries to remind herself that she has a job to do and that helping others makes her a better person. We are very lucky to have a person like Ruth Ann join our group. Be sure to welcome her when you have a chance.
