### LOCAL SCHOLARSHIPS:

AAUW-MPB CSUMB Scholarship winners

Four outstanding and deserving young women from CSU Monterey Bay were selected for our \$1,500 AAUW Local Scholarships from a pool of 52 applicants and 9 finalists. Many of the applicants are the first in their family to ever attend college. They have faced significant difficulties (financial, societal, medical, logistical) in their quest to get an education. Yet, they push forward with determination and a positive attitude. Hear a little more of their stories:

Sandra Zuniga Ruiz is a 20 year old senior Math major from Salinas with an amazing 3.963 GPA, even after taking difficult upper division math classes. Her mother has worked very hard raising her and her brother after Sandra's father left when Sandra was 8. They moved away from their dangerous neighborhood to the outskirts of Salinas after their house burned down in an electrical fire in 2012. Sandra now rises early to take the high school bus into town, then takes another bus over to CSUMB.

She would love to get an advanced math degree or possibly a law degree, based on the legal needs she saw in her community while working with her mother in the farm fields last summer.

Jordan Cosby is a 22 year old from Castroville who will be a senior Collaborative Health and Human Services major. She has a 3.865 GPA. Her interest area is in health care policy and/or administration. She felt compelled to enter this area after watching her stepfather lose his battle with cancer, partially due to delayed treatment because of the structure of the Medical system. She is currently an intern for the PG Housing department and shows herself to be a leader and an excellent advocate in that role and others.

Morgan Kashata is a 23 year old Business/Accounting major from PG with 3.814 GPA. She struggled with medical issues after an accident in high school but has now recovered and is determined to make a difference in either the business world or in public policy. Just after our interview, she was also selected as a CSUMB Congressional intern through the Panetta Institute of Public Policy. Her family's financial struggles have done nothing to deter her from setting and achieving ambitious goals.

**Denise Rubio** is 21, from Watsonville, and will be a junior in Liberal Studies. She maintains a 3.62 GPA. Her goal is to be a bilingual elementary and/or special education teacher in the Watsonville area. She has a passion for Creative Writing as well and she volunteers at the local high school and church. She has also fought medical issues but is able to manage well now with the proper medicines.

Congratulations to these four young women on their scholarships!

A very big THANKS to the AAUW members who helped with the selection process. Judy Ritchey, Karen Snow, Mary Conway and Kay Morris helped review the semi-finalists and/or interview the finalists. A very BIG thanks to Jeanne Krener, who read all of the 52 applications with me and helped narrow down our semi-finalists. She also was an interviewer and she and her husband, Art, an Applied Math professor, have met with Sandra to discuss mathrelated careers and possible graduate schools.

The interviews for our three MPC scholarships are soon and I will report on the scholarship winners in our next newsletter.

# Matching Funds for donations to Local Scholarship fund

Over the last couple of years, AAUW-MPB has grown the number of local scholarships and the amount of each scholarship. In the current round, we will be awarding seven \$1,500 scholarships. The additional funds have primarily come from grants we have received from local community organizations.

We have seen the needs of the students grow dramatically over the last few years. The cost of tuition and fees at CSUMB has risen 81% in the last 6 years. We hear stories of students having a garage sale to raise the funds needed for gas to get to class. Many have absolutely no funding available from their families; indeed some need to contribute to the household income as well. Students often juggle more than one job with their full load of classes and other commitments as well.

We will continue to submit grant applications and hope for continued community support in this fashion. Of course, we will continue to raise funds by working at our polling location in PG.

If you would like to contribute to the local scholarship fund, we have an offer to match any funds, up to a cumulative total of \$1,500, for donations received by July 1, 2013. #### TECH TREK SCHOLARSHIPS AWARDED

Two 7th-grade students from Pacific Grove Middle School will be attending Tech Trek at Stanford University this summer. The 2013 Scholarship recipients are Sarah Bitter and Jordan Modisette. The Tech Trek Committee, Betsey Skinner, Valda Fletcher, Carol Young, and chaired by Marilyn Erikson, read through the 16 applications, interviewed 8 applicants, and ultimately chose Sarah and Jordan to attend Camp Marie Curie at Stanford University from July 7-13.

Tech Trek is a special project supported by the Monterey Peninsula Branch of AAUW. Each scholarship is worth \$900. The girls were chosen on the basis of their essay entitled "How would you use math or science to make the world better." They were also chosen for their enthusiasm for having the opportunity to attend this special camp as expressed in their interview. In order to apply, 7th grade girls must be nominated by their math or science teacher. The purpose of the scholarship is to encourage girls to continue their studies in science, technology, engineering or math (STEM), and hopefully attend a good college or university to prepare for a career in one of these disciplines. Tech Trek gives these girls a chance to see role models of women who have chosen careers in science, technology, engineering or math and to spend a week with them and other girls doing special projects, field trips and classes to expand their knowledge and excitement in science and math classes that are above and beyond the typical educational experience for girls at this age.

Tech Trek was started by AAUW in 1996. More than 8,000 girls have attended the program which is held on 8

campuses in California.

We will be meeting with the two selected students in the Fall to hear about their camp experience.
