AAUW Launches "I Am the Face of Pay Equity" Campaign

This year is all about Pay Equity as far as our association is concerned. You'll be hearing much, much more on this subject. We have, indeed, come a long way in climbing the "equality ladder". AAUW can claim much credit for the single salary schedules, devoid of gender bias, that evolved during the twentieth century.

Despite the gains that have been made, women still lag far behind men in pay equity.

AAUW branches across the country are engaging in a variety of activities to promote pay equity on Equal Pay Day. Community leaders educate and unite their communities in support of the Fair Pay Restoration Act (S. 1843), which addresses the U.S. Supreme Court's recent, wrongheaded decision in Ledbetter v. Goodyear Tire and Rubber Company. Urge your senators to support the Fair Pay Restoration Act. With the exciting prospect of this bill moving through Congress, all AAUW members must do their part to promote it.

AAUW selected seven teams from universities around the country to receive Campus Action Project (CAP) grants. The awardees are implementing projects based on the recommendations in Behind the Pay Gap for promoting pay equity. For Equal Pay Day 2008, students at Alfred University in New York will premiere their short film, Dreams to Reality, a student-produced and directed documentary highlighting the financial hopes and realities of recent AU alumni. The film is a powerful tool for research, publicity, and education about pay equity. Three of the CAP team advisers are members of the AAUW Alfred-Hornell (NY) Branch.

The CAP team from the University of Alaska, Fairbanks, will mark Equal Pay Day with a keynote address by Martha West, a nationally known scholar on employment and sex-based discrimination. The CAP project leader, Kayt Sunwood, is a member of the AAUW Fairbanks (AK) Branch.

EDUCATIONAL FOUNDATION [EF] SCHOLARSHIPS

For the 2007-2008 academic year the Monterey Peninsula Branch of AAUW contributed \$1,500 to Educational Foundation [EF] Scholarships. Nancy Iversen was named a Gift Honoree with a \$750 donation. The Eleanor Roosevelt Scholarship Fund received a \$750 donation. These national scholarships were funded by members of the branch, the fall rummage sale, and interest from branch CDs.

During this academic year the AAUW Educational Foundation provided a total of 4.1 million to 253 recipients of fellowships, grants and special awards. There were 88 American fellowships from 1,036 applicants. Forty one Fellows/Recipients are studying in California this year.

AAUW is the largest source of funding exclusively for graduate women.


