

DEFEAT OF PAYCHECK FAIRNESS ACT

AAUW is widely credited with keeping pay equity on the nation's radar. On average, women still make only 77 cents for every dollar a man earns. Even collegeeducated women still earn less than men, despite the same major and occupation as their male counterparts.

On November 17, the Senate rejected by a 58-41 vote through a procedural maneuver the Paycheck Fairness Act {182/S 3772}. Despite widespread support of the legislation from the White House and ordinary Americans committed to basic fairness and equality, it was a missed opportunity to make history and jump start real economic change for American women and their families. It is a stark reality that most American families depend on the paychecks of women.

The Paycheck Fairness Act would have updated the landmark Equal Pay Act of 1963 by closing loopholes, strengthening incentives to prevent pay discrimination, and prohibiting retaliation against workers who inquire about employers' wage practices or disclose their own wages.

While troubled by the vote, AAUW is determined that we will eventually win the fight for true pay equity.


- When to meet morning, afternoon or evening.

Guest Speaker: Juliet Peck, Partner in the Law Offices of Lawrence & Peck

Ms. Peck plans to briefly present a historical perspective regarding female attorneys who practice in the realm of Criminal Law, the domain for litigation between Private Parties and Society. Civil Law, the more commonly practiced female attorney specialty, is litigation between one Private Party and another Private Party. Does gender interfere with choices as our young women prepare to specialize within the Criminal versus Civil Law communities? Does gender get in the way of perceived effectiveness as juries deliberate the guilt or innocence of accused criminals defended by a female attorney? Interesting. Fascinating will be Ms. Peck's recollection, as the public defender for several Monterey County high publicity cases, of how things are often done in our male dominated Criminal Law proceedings. A case in point was a 1996 horrific murder finally brought to trial in 2005. Public Defender Peck's thorough investigation and vigorous defense tactics were fascinating. Expensive, yes. Guilty, no.
