At this point in time, we are 87 women strong, on a mission to advance equity for women and girls through education. With this goal in mind, we financially support a number of projects through donations and fundraising.

We are presently selling \$10 tickets for Macy's Community Day on Saturday, Nov. 13. As in years past, our branch keeps the \$10 for each ticket and sends it on to our national organization to support the Legal Advocacy Fund. Last year we were able to contribute \$500 to this cause. This year our branch was able to give four \$1,200 scholarships to women graduates of MPC who moved on to four year colleges and universities. As most of you know, we staff a polling place in Pacific Grove to fund these local scholarships as well as to contribute to the community and the elective process. We are grateful to Ruthann Donahue and Betty Van Meter for their continuing hard work in this area.

California is the only state in the national organization to sponsor Tech Trek, summer camps on university campuses that provide middle school girls a chance to explore the sciences. Thanks to member support we have been able to send a student for the last several years to Stanford. We held a TGIF fundraiser on Oct. 16 to get a chance to hear from our sponsored student and to raise some for the \$800 plus dollars it takes to sponsor a student.

The branch also contributes to the AAUW Educational Opportunities Fund which gives

post graduate women both from the U.S. and abroad an opportunity to continue their research and studies as well as provides project grants to members and branches.

With the economic downturn and fewer members it becomes more difficult to continue to support these causes and continue to serve our members with interesting programs. Our budget which includes the newsletter, directory and insurance is really tight this year. We are looking for fundraising ideas and members who are willing to implement them. LAF 2010/2011 fiscal year fund raising event

IN MEMORIAL

Peggy Bates

Peggy Bates, an esteemed 50-year-member of AAUW, passed away September 14 at the age of 92 at her home on Jack's Peak in Monterey. She was well respected as a philanthropist and was involved in a long list of charitable causes since moving to the Monterey Peninsula in 1946.

"She gave of her time and talents. She is someone who chose not to live a life of affluence and comfort, but one of service," Chuck Harmon, head of York School, said in the Monterey Herald. In the same article, Rep. Sam Farr, D-Carmel, said, "Everyone knew Peggy Bates was a powerhouse. She had ideas and lots of creative vision. People listened to her." Farr's father, Fred Farr, then a state senator, encouraged Peggy to get involved in education on the Peninsula.

She was instrumental in the founding of Monterey Peninsula College. She served on several local boards of education and the first junior college district board. In 1960, Governor Pat Brown appointed her to the State Board of Education and as Trustee of the California State Universities and Colleges. She chose York School as one of her causes even though none of her children attended the school.

Peggy personified the role of citizen-educator during the 60 years she lived on the Peninsula. Among her passions were: conservation and the environment; child welfare and child abuse prevention; and educational opportunities for women. Her philanthropy was recognized with numerous awards and honors. She enjoyed travel, poetry and play reading

Born in New York City in 1918, she received her B.A. from Barnard College, her M.A. in American History from Washington University and she was a Ph.D. candidate in American History at Columbia University. She was predeceased by her husband, Talcott, in 1985 and by her daughter, Margaret Schieffelin, who died in infancy. She is survived by four sons, David Talcott, Seth Pardee and Charles Carroll, all of Carmel, and Anthony Stewart of Grand Junction, CO, seven grand-children and three great grandchildren.
