Social Security is one of our country's most successful anti-poverty programs, providing benefits to children, disabled workers, surviving spouses, and retirees. Without Social Security more than half of older women would fall into poverty. Without it more than two-thirds of unmarried women would be living below the poverty line. Social Security also supports more children than Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF), also known as welfare.

The National Commission on Fiscal and Financial Reform, was created in February, however, AAUW is worried that members of the Commission view cuts to Social Security as a potential way to cut the deficit. Social Security legally cannot borrow money and therefore does not contribute to the deficit and cutting benefits will not reduce the deficit. The Social Security program currently has a surplus of over \$2.5 trillion and is expected to be able to pay full benefits for another quarter of a century, giving Congress ample time to make adjustments to future benefits during the normal legislative process.

The Commission, both Republican and Democrat, will make recommendations to Congress for balancing the budget and for related fiscal issues by December 1.

These recommendations could fast-track cuts to Social Security, including monthly benefits, privatizing accounts, and raising the retirement age -- a benefit cut that places the greatest hardship on older Americans.

TAKE ACTION!

Send a message to members of the Commission today and let them know that cutting Social Security is unacceptable.

LOCAL SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM CONTINUES

The Local Scholarship program continues to be the principal community service aspect of AAUW MPB. The program is funded by Team for Democracy volunteers who staff the polls and donations from members. Thanks to two special elections this summer, we were able to fund four \$1200 awards for local students.

All four awardees are graduates of Monterey Peninsula College and will attend four year universities this fall. **Lindy Morrison** is straight A student who will pursue a teaching degree at CSUMB. In addition, she volunteers at Ord Terrace Elementary School and works 25 hours a week. She writes, "My heart breaks for students who are overlooked ...and I want to be the person who comes into their lives and shows them that they are worth so much more than they can possibly imagine." Lindy's college fund was decimated by her mother's recent health needs. With great poignancy in her thank you letter, she describes that our award is not just for her, but for her entire family.

Yuliana Vasquez will transfer from MPC to UC Santa Cruz to continue studies in Sociology with the goal of earning a MA in Family Therapy. She volunteers as a translator and mentor at Juvenile Hall in Salinas and in the Court Appointed Special Advocates program. Yuliana's parents are agricultural workers and she is the first in her family to attend college. This achievement came with personal challenge as she comes from a large family and, lacking supervision and self-confidence, she states that she made some wrong choices. At age 16 she became a single parent and her goal to succeed in acquiring a good education is in part inspired by her desire to give her son a better future. Our assistance will enable her to spend more time with her family as she continues her studies. She writes, "Your generosity has inspired me to help others and give back to the community."

Heather Cusson joined the military after high school to escape a dysfunctional family. In 2006 she was deployed to Afghanistan where she served as the Brigade Command Sergeant Major's personal security medic. She treated both adult and pediatric trauma of the worst imaginable degree. She has earned an AA and completed the prerequisites for the Coburn School of Nursing in addition to volunteer work at Meals on Wheels and SPCA. She is wait listed and will enter her clinical studies in 2012. This fall Heather will transfer to CSUMB to study Collaborative Health and Human Service with the long-term goal of earning an advanced degree in nursing.

Eva Ochoa graduated from Monterey Adult school and earned an AA in Child Development at MPC. This fall she will transfer to CSUMB to pursue a degree in Community Studies. Eva aspires to become a social worker for abused and neglected children. Eva sought escape from a difficult childhood in her studies. At present her goal to earn a college degree is supported by both her husband and children. She makes time to coach youth sports and hold several leadership positions at MPC. She writes, "Living in a less privileged community has made me realize the importance of higher education. I am thankful that there are wonderful people like you who are willing to help students with their education." Both Eva and Yuliana were featured in a front page Monterey Herald article in May.

Each of these women's lives has been positively impacted by the generosity of our AAUW membership. The scholarship fund always operates on a very slim margin and assistance by donations or volunteering to work at the polls would help insure that this community initiative can continue.
