In these challenging economic times, we are especially grateful to our long-time member Sharon Maney for funding a student to represent our branch at this summer's Tech Trek camp at Stanford. Begun in 1998, this camp encourages the girls' exploration of science, math and technology. At a time when America is lagging behind in these fields, AAUW California is being pro-active in this arena. Nationally, AAUW has just been awarded a prestigious National Science Foundation grant "to study the causes and dynamics of low participation of women" in the STEM (science, technology, engineering and math) fields. This quote is from the announcement by our national association regarding this, our fourth grant from the NSF. What a feather in our cap!

Tech Trek recently published a survey of attendees from 1998-2001, "The Impact of Tech Trek camp". Most of them indicated that this program strongly influenced their choice of classes, and more importantly, it impacted their positive decisions to pursue careers in the STEM fields they once thought only meant for males. How appropriate for us to keep advocating in such a positive way for young women in the 21st century.

And I am sorry for those of you who missed our fabulous tour of Asilomar, one of two buildings designed by Julia Morgan that is on the National Register of Historic Places. She is the only woman architect with two designated buildings. Ranger Roxanne was most

informative and highly entertaining. If you have never visited the public structures there, I highly recommend doing so. Plaques on the walls help you in a self-guided tour of this unique place right in our backyard.

Baby Boomers Decreased Investment in Retirement Savings

According to the Wall Street Journal, AARP recently conducted a survey that found that one in five baby boomers have reigned in their investments in retirement accounts. Currently, over 60 percent of private sector workers have 401(K) investment plans but earlier survevs have revealed that people are not investing enough money in these plans. Due to a slumping economy, people are starting to lessen their contributions to these accounts, and the survey shows that over the past year, 20 percent of people age 45 and older have stopped investing in their retirement accounts. Of the 20 percent of people who discontinued investing in their retirement account, 83 percent said they didn't have enough money left over after current expenses. Many of the people surveyed are considering the fact that they may have to postpone retirement or not retire at all because they do not have enough money saved to retire. Due to the current economic situation, people making less than \$30,000 a year, Hispanics, and women were also very likely to stop their investment savings.

This issue is one that AAUW champions because women of retirement age live in poverty in higher rates than men. Women are also less likely to invest in other retirement options and rely more heavily on social security benefits. AAUW is committed to a Social Security system that provides lifelong protections for women and families that include guaranteed benefits with cost-of-living adjustments.

We can be proud: NEW LEADERSHIP ROLE FOR AAUW

AAUW has gained special consultative status at the United Nations with the Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC), which initiates reports, makes recommendations, and promotes respect for human rights and fundamental freedoms.

For many years, AAUW has had a U.N. representative attending select meetings and monitoring issues affecting women and girls. The new designation allows AAUW to participate in international conferences, sign on to NGO statements, and share AAUW's expertise.

"We closely follow a variety of international issues ranging from girls' education to women's economic security to human rights to women in peacekeeping, said AAUW Executive Director Linda D. Hallman, CAE." This new status will strengthen AAUW's presence globally and provide us with greater opportunities to engage in U.N.-related activities and initiatives that break through barriers for women and girls.

AAUW has a proud history in global affairs that includes awarding more than 2,200 international fellowships to women from more than 130 countries and partnering with leading international humanitarian organizations on initiatives to empower women.

Next year, AAUW will actively advocate for women at the 53rd session of the U.N. Commission on the Status of

Women, which will focus on the equal sharing of responsibilities between women and men, including caregiving in the context of HIV/AIDS.

"AAUW can now advocate more effectively and support policies aimed at strengthening gender equality, especially in the areas of the economic, social, political, and reproductive health rights of women and girls," said Carolyn Donovan, AAUW's U.N. representative.

Currently, AAUW is encouraging its branches to commemorate the 60th anniversary of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights on December 10 and to continue supporting ratification of the women's rights treaty, the Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination Against Women (CEDAW).

"AAUW members have long supported our efforts, from hosting international visitors to initiating forums and symposia on global issues pertinent to women and girls, said Gloria L. Blackwell, AAUW's director of fellowships, grants, and international programs. We are thrilled that our role is expanding.
