AAUW was represented at National Press Club's Newsmaker News Conference in January to speak on policy trends in the fight to end campus sexual assault.

Linda Upmeyer is the first woman to become Speaker of the lowa house.

Charlene attended Kinman Business College, Spokane, WA. She programmed IBM keypunch machines. She moved to Salinas, working for the Salinas Union High School District. She became operations manager at a savings and loan, then a programmer at an insurance company. At MPC and Hartnell, she earned several Associates degrees and a Certificate of Data Processing, then taught computer classes there. Graduating from San Jose State, she became a Software Engineer. Proposed Changes:

1. Change this text in Article II. Government

"The Local Scholarship Program governance shall be comprised of a chairperson plus three members, one of whom shall serve as treasurer." to:

"The Local Scholarship Program governance shall be comprised of a chairperson plus a minimum of two committee members, one of whom shall serve as the Local Scholarship Treasurer."

- 2. Change the first duty of the Local Scholarship chairperson in Article XI. Duties from:
- "1. To select three members to serve on the committee."

to:

"1. To select a minimum of two members to serve on the committee."

We are in the process of choosing two 7th grade girls who will receive our Monterey Peninsula Branch AAUW scholarships to attend Tech Trek Grace Hopper Summer Camp at Stanford University, July 3-9, 2016. Thirty-six girls from four different Middle Schools were nominated by their math or science teachers. Applications were due by February 26, to be read by the committee on March 2. Ten girls will be chosen then and interviewed on March 19.

Charlene Setlow, a new AAUW member, has established a scholarship in memory of her mother, Louise V. Setlow, funding one Tech Trek scholarship per year (worth \$900). Charlene is now on the Tech Trek Committee, taking part in choosing the girls who will attend the Grace Hopper Camp. We are very grateful for this wonderful contribution to the program. Charlene actually contributed \$1,000 this year, to "sweeten the pot", as she said. She is passionate about young women learning math and science skills, as she was not encouraged in these areas as a young woman, and had to work very hard to achieve her goals. She says, "As I worked diligently getting my education, working one or more jobs, as my mother did, while going to school part-time solidified my conviction to help other women avoid this arduous trek; hence my involvement with AAUW and support of young women's attendance in Tech Trek camps." Her mother was denied access to high school, having helped deliver a younger brother. Eventually she worked her way through school and helped a younger sister to graduate.
