The national organization is emphasizing interest in the STEM fields (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics). Because it is encouraging women and girls to enter the STEM fields, Symantec Corporation has donated \$100,000 to AAUW to "develop a cyber security core class for middle school girls interested in STEM."

AAUW History on the Monterey Peninsula

The California Room at the Monterey Public Library has our history, carefully collected and preserved in a secure climate-controlled room, made accessible to scholars and the public for research. It is readily available to us!

This collection is sifted from 60 years of scrapbooks of what we have done, the fun we have had along the way, and is a revelation of the power of women in our branch of AAUW and our accomplishments.

To access this collection you need to do the following: - Make an appointment. Contact Dennis Copeland (646-3741), the Mtry Library/Mtry City Archivist. You may be referred to Jeanne McCombs (646-1995).

- **Specify what records** you are researching. The AAUW History is file number ARC 572, listed as "Inventory of American Association of University Women, Monterey Peninsula Branch; Collection 1954/1999, Collection 2000/2007, and Collection 2009/2014."

Schedule date and time to do research.

- **Start at the General Reference Desk.** Show ID. You will be ushered upstairs to the CA Room; a staff member must unlock the door. Materials specified and CA Room Archivist or designated Staff will be ready for you.

This is OUR HISTORY, carefully collected over the years by our historians, by our current historian Nancy Iversen for a good many of those years. You will be amazed by the photos, clippings, and stories. We can be proud to be associated with such an illustrious group and our archives give us an appreciation for how far we have come.
