The gardens were begun by Englishman Francis Lester in 1930 and continued by the Wiley family since 1948. The three sons of Patricia Stender Wiley have run it since 1998. Check out the website rosesofyesterday.com to read all about the history, see wedding pictures of one son's wedding to Guenivere, and photos of the roses they sell. In May there are no bare root plants available, but one and five gallon plants are for sale.

A family member will be at the gardens to be our guide. After the tour, there are picnic tables where we can enjoy our lunches.

This year the core classes are in Physics in Motion, 3-D Math, Forensic Science, Marine Biology, Cyber Security Sleuthing, and Computer Coding. The girls spend one week, July 12-18, at Stanford living in a dorm to attend classes in science, technology, engineering and math (STEM).

Our branch received a grant from Yellow Brick Road which will pay for one full scholarship of \$900. The money for the other scholarship was raised at our fundraiser last October.

We will have our Fundraiser in 2015 on Sunday, October 18, at the home of Lucy Campen, 10 White Tail Lane, Monterey, from 2-4 pm.

A total of 76 girls from the Bay Area extending down to Monterey will benefit from this incredible program. Only a girl who has won an AAUW Tech Trek scholarship can attend.
